


### Welcoming New Producers

### **Notable Union Cases**

## Redevelopment of cell 6 at Stablex

In Blainville, a project to redevelop industrial residues and contaminated soil could have an impact on local market garden producers. **Basses-Laurentides UPA**, with the support of the federation, voiced its opposition during public consultations, which led the city to abandon the project. Despite this victory, **follow-up is still required in view of government announcements** that could support the company in its expansion project.

### **Agricultural Plastics**

The issue of agricultural plastics and their recovery with AgriRÉCUP received a great deal of attention. La Lièvre UPA met with the organization's management to find solutions adapted to regional realities. Some solutions will be implemented shortly.

# Project to connect a gas pipeline between Sainte-Sophie and Mirabel

Sainte-Scholastique-Mirabel UPA was heavily involved in negotiations concerning the gas pipeline route proposed by Energir, making representations to the BAPE and the CPTAQ. After numerous exchanges, an agreement was reached on the management of the right-of-way in agricultural and forestry areas, as well as on compensation and mitigation measures. This major gain will serve as a model for future similar negotiations throughout Quebec.

### **Notable Union Cases**

### Crisis Management

On December 3, 2023, a dike failure alert was issued in the Upper Laurentians, affecting hundreds of residents and agricultural producers. **La Lièvre UPA**, supported by the federation and funded by MAPAQ, quickly put in place an **emergency plan coordinated with local authorities** to ensure the safety of producers and animals during the crisis.

# Mining activities and Protection of the Territory

The UPA unions of the Collines de l'Outaouais, Papineau, Vallée-de-la-Gatineau and of Pontiac have been instrumental in protecting farmland from mining claims. Through research and consultation with experts, they found a legal solution to have certain territories recognized as incompatible with mining activities (TIAM). This initiative has enabled several municipalities, including Gatineau, to adopt measures to protect agricultural land. These concrete actions strengthen the defense of agricultural heritage in the face of industrial pressures.

## A19 Extension from Laval to Bois-des-Fillion

The project to extend the A19 motorway in Laval and Bois-des-Filion gave rise to numerous representations to guarantee agricultural producers access to their land. Thanks to the involvement of the **Laval UPA**, measures have been put in place to ensure that **producers can maintain adequate access to their land** during and after the construction work. In addition, an out-of-court agreement was reached with the Commission de protection du territoire agricole du Québec (CPTAQ), allowing the revocation of an authorization that compromised agricultural activities. These steps are designed to preserve the integrity of farming operations throughout the project.

# Land Use Planning & Protection

### **CPTAQ files**

The Federation is called upon by the Commission de protection du territoire agricole du Québec (CPTAQ) to make recommendations on requests for authorization in agricultural zones. After consultation with the local unions concerned, the Federation has given its opinion on all applications relating to the protection of agricultural land.



# Land Use Planning & Protection

### **Land Use Planning Policy**

The Federation's Planning Committee met on numerous occasions this year to revise its policy, ensuring that it was in line with that recently adopted by the Confederation. The aim was to ensure that this policy responds to regional realities while providing precise guidance for development files and interventions with the CPTAQ.

# Migratory bird scaring program in agricultural areas

This year, the Federation took charge of the complete organization of goose scaring operations, usually entrusted to an outside firm. An advisor to the affiliated unions oversaw the hiring and coordination of bird scaring partners to protect the harvests of regional producers.

# National consultation on agricultural territory and activities

The Federation played a key role in **several major government consultations**. Among these, the revision of the Règlement sur les exploitations agricoles and the revision of the Loi sur la protection du territoire et des activités agricoles required active and committed representation on our part. Our interventions took the form of **rigorous**, **well-documented briefs**. We took part in regional consultations in the Laurentians, Outaouais, Laval and Montreal, highlighting issues specific to each territory.

## Agroenvironment

### **Agriclimat**

Farms resilient to climate change

5 farms in the region have been participating in the pilot farm network since 2022 as part of the Agriclimat phase 2 project. Their diagnosis documents the opportunities and threats associated with climate change at farm level, and produces a GHG emissions balance sheet. Producers are then supported in adjusting their decisions to adapt to the climate and reduce or sequester carbon. At the same time, the regional working group, set up in 2017, met in February 2024 to comment on the balance sheets of the 38 pilot farms in Quebec and assess which adaptation measures were applicable to their business.

### Beef in the service of biodiversity

the Quebec Cattle Production (PBQ) encourage des **practices that promote biodiversity,** supported by training courses organized by the regional federation.

During a session at Grazing Days Farm on July 10, participants observed the **positive impact of beef production on wildlife**, and Philippe Lavoie, agronomist at Bovi-Expert presented techniques for improving grazing management.

# Écoute-action agroenvironnement \* in Outaouais coming soon!


Thanks to funding from the Entente sectorielle bioalimentaire de l'Outaouais, we will be able to set up an agri-environmental listening-action service, including farm visits to meet the specific needs of the region's agricultural producers. This resource will offer personalized support, directing producers towards the programs best suited to their reality.

# ALUS Outaouais & Laurentides

### Program in full expansion

ALUS offers **technical and financial support** to producers, and financially compensates the areas created over a minimum period of **5 years**. The program mobilizes agricultural producers to create, restore and maintain natural environments that help build collective resilience and resolve climate and biodiversity crises.

In Outaouais-Laurentides, **2 ALUS communities** works with several partners to maximize the expertise and financial support available to growers. Thanks to funding from Service Canada, a technician has been added to the team to support field work.

### Media Impact

### Grande Virée

Two editions of the Grande Virée were organized in August 2023 and April 2024, bringing together six employers and 40 retired or newly retired candidates. These events created a direct link between employers and experienced talent, with a placement rate of over 50%.

The positions filled were mainly in **customer service, agricultural processing and tractor driving.** This initiative has helped to meet the need for skilled workers in the agricultural sector.

## Agricultural Employment Center

## Recognition Events and Activities

Over the past year, several initiatives have been put in place to recognize and support temporary foreign workers (TET).

In September 2023, **over 300 TETs took part in a recognition mass** at St-Benoît de Mirabel. In October, an outing was organized for **45 of them to attend a Laval Rocket game.** 

In July 2024, the Intercultural Festival in Mont-Laurier brought together over 500 TETs to celebrate cultural diversity.

A networking evening in November 2023 honored candidates who completed their training at Fermemploi.

Finally, in February 2024, a delegation of **20 employers travelled by bus to the Agricarrières HR symposium in Trois-Rivières.** 

# Rouge, jaune, vert for Mental Health

On November 23, 2023, a performance of the play Rouge, jaune, vert brought together 60 people to discuss this often taboo subject. The play, aimed at both men and women farmers, addresses the challenges of this trying profession, and suggests possible solutions. Faced with the many uncontrollable factors in their daily lives, it's essential to break the isolation and offer support. This initiative aims to open dialogue and provide resources to those in need.
